**Aiken County's Proposed
Ozone Level Reduction**

Aiken County is committed to develop, implement, and maintain and Ozone Reduction Early Action Plan. The purpose and goals of this plan are to obtain cleaner air sooner than is federally mandated for the benefit of the citizens of Aiken County.

Year Round Ozone Reduction Actions:

1. **Bio-Diesel/ Alternative fuels:** Aiken County has converted its transit fleet to bio-diesel fuel and has plans to convert its remaining diesel powered vehicles to bio-diesel by October 2003. The County will also look into obtaining the new type 2 fuels for its remaining fleet as soon as it is available in this area. The County plans to replace its fleet with new cleaner burning vehicles or alternative fuel vehicles such as natural gas over the next five to seven years. All three Cities located within the County are looking at similar policies. Additionally, the local power company converted from coal burning turbines to gas burning turbines.
2. **Community Awareness and Education:** The County in conjunction with the Cities plans to promote community awareness and education through alerts in the local media, through distribution of educational materials,

- through public speaking, and through involvement with local businesses, industries, and organizations.
3. City/County Energy Conservation Plan: Develop an Energy Conservation Plan that reduces yearly energy consumption in County facilities by 5 to 10 percent monthly. All three Cities will enact similar plans within their jurisdictions.
 4. Stricter Controls for Outside Burning: The County will work with the local fire district and local fire departments to limit open burning from May through September. The Cities of Aiken and North Augusta prohibit open burning within their city limits.
 5. Promote Multi-modal Land Use Strategies: All jurisdictions will work with their Planning Commissions to encourage the requirement of pedestrian and bicycle facilities in new developments. They will also encourage development near activity centers and transit routes. Additionally, all jurisdictions will establish minimum tree planning requirements for all new developments.
 6. Intelligent Transportation Systems: The Augusta Regional Transportation Study has the installation of ITS equipment in its current TIP. Aiken County has an Advanced Traffic Management System Master Plan completed for the entire urbanized area. The County has plans to begin installing ITS technology within the next 5 to 8 years along the major routes.
 7. Stage 1 or Stage 2 Vapor Recovery at Gas Stations: Work with local Gas Stations to encourage the voluntary installation of Stage 1 or Stage 2 Vapor Recovery Systems.
 8. Alternative Work Schedules: Local governments are researching the possibility of offering staggered work times to their employees to reduce the number of vehicles on the roadways during AM and PM rush hours. Several local industries and employers are researching similar programs.
 9. Commuter Choice Program: Aiken County Transit recently met with local industry to promote their new Commuter Choice Program. The program provides a guaranteed ride to work for employees and is provided by the employer for the employee at a discounted rate. Several participants were interested starting the

program at their workplace. The Transit system will continue to promote this program.

10. Reduction of Idling Policy: All local government departments and the local school board are developing plans to reduce or eliminate idling times on all fleet vehicles and equipment.

Ozone Action Days:

1. Prohibit Open Burning: During an ozone action day, the County will prohibit all open burning. This ban will be coordinated with the local Fire District and local law enforcement.
2. Encourage Car-pooling and Mass Transit: Local governments, local businesses, and local industries will encourage employees to car-pool, use mass transit, walk, or bike to work on ozone action days.
3. Restrict Nonessential Vehicle Usage: All local governments agree to limit fleet vehicle usage to essential governmental operations only on ozone action days.
4. Restrict Lawn Mowing, Painting, and Chemical Use: All local governments agree to prohibit lawn care, painting, and industrial chemical usage within their operations on ozone action days. Through media alerts, the general public will be encouraged to reschedule these activities to non-ozone action days.
5. Encourage Employees to Eat Lunch In-house: All department heads will encourage their employees to eat lunch in-house or walk to lunch on ozone action days.
6. Employ Stricter Energy Conservation Measures: On ozone action days, all department heads will restrict energy consumption to equipment, lights, and machines essential for daily business. Several local businesses and industries will employ similar requirements at their facilities on ozone action days.
7. Encourage Re-fueling in the Evening: All local governments will require that refueling of fleet vehicles occurs in the late afternoon on ozone action days. Through media alerts, the general public will be encouraged to refuel in the evening.

Public Involvement Plan:

The Aiken County Air Quality Committee plans to hold two public information meetings as part of our Early Action Plan. These meetings will be held early in the process and held in different locations within the County. Our hope is that these meetings will educate the public and gain support for our plans. Thus, this effort will help ensure the success of the Early Action Plan.

At these meetings, the Committee will present its plan for air quality improvement. Educational materials will be available as well as presentations on how those attending and their neighbors can aid in the effort to clean up Aiken County's air. Committee members will be available to answer questions and address concerns.

In addition to the meetings, the Committee plans to distribute information to the public at other public meetings, such as transportation information meetings, and at other events that occur around the County. Through these efforts, the Committee hopes to make a large number of the population aware of the problem and to use their comments to improve our efforts.

Work Plan for Travel Time and Speed Data Collection In the Augusta-Aiken Region

This scope of services describes activities that PBS&J will perform in conducting a travel time and speed study in the Augusta, Georgia – Aiken, South Carolina region. An estimated budget corresponding to the work plan is attached as Exhibit A at the end of this document. We suggest that a schedule for performing the work be prepared in collaboration with ARTS in Subtask 1.3. PBS&J's work will be designed to build on travel time and speed data that is already collected by the Augusta Regional Transportation Study (ARTS) for its Congestion Management System.

The travel time and speed data will be processed and summarized in formats that will be suitable to evaluate elements of the travel demand model and emissions estimation procedures employed by the Georgia Department of Transportation (Ga. DOT) in its studies of urbanized areas. It is anticipated these will take the form of route-level and link-level statistics. Route-level statistics will include average speed and time data that is organized by time period and direction of travel. Link-level statistics will be partitioned into average speed by the network attributes "Fclass" and "Area" by time of day and direction of travel.

Our work plan and cost estimate assumes that the ARTS staff will collect at least 324 samples on 18 different routes using GPS equipment. We expect that ARTS staff will download time and position data from their GPS data collectors onto a desktop computer. The GPS data will be stored in files that will be transmitted to PBS&J via email or posted on a ftp site. Furthermore, that each digital file transmitted to PBS&J will contain time and position data for sample runs collected on a single route and will be labeled in a pre-determined manner established in collaboration between ARTS and PBS&J. At the onset of the project, ARTS staff needs to provide PBS&J with a data dictionary of each field output by the GPS units along with a sample text file so that PBS&J can modify its computer programs that reduce gross data into sample route and sample segment files.

A few driving rules must be followed by ARTS staff in conducting the field work. Drivers' behavior needs to conform to the following:

- Drive at a speed that is below the fastest and higher than the slowest – preferably near the average speed that all other motorists drive on a particular route during that time period and in that direction of travel.
- Once a sample run is begun, the driver must not deviate from that route except for an emergency. If a driver deviates from the route, that observation run will likely be discarded as a "bad" sample.
- When a driver reaches the end of a sample run, he or she must drive for 100 yards or more in a direction that is away from the intersection marking the end of the route before turning back to start another sample run.

Task 1.0 Develop Sampling Plan

Prior to designing the Travel Time and Speed Study for the Augusta-Aiken region, ARTS had sampling and data collection plans to support its CMS program. Sampling for the Travel Time and Speed Study builds off of ARTS' CMS data collection, but needs more routes and samples. The CMS program is an ongoing study, that is conducted annually. The CMS data collection procedure includes different routes from year to year. In contrast, data for the Travel Time and Speed Study is being collected at one time and may not be collected again for several or more years.

Subtask 1.1 - Revise Route Selection. Using ARTS' planned CMS route sample for 2003, we will expand it to be responsive to requirements necessary for calculations of average travel time and speed over a cross-section of routes, link facility types and link area types.

Subtask 1.2 – Revise Sampling Plan. PBS&J will recommend that ARTS add sample runs in the off-peak time period for its 2003 data collection program. ARTS' previous sampling plan included 12 samples per route. PBS&J is proposing a minimum of 18 per route. For those routes that experience peak period congestion or that are perceived to have peak period congestion, we strongly recommend that additional sample runs be conducted in the peak hour and peak direction of travel.

As part of PBS&J's data reduction and quality control procedures, data from some sample runs could possibly be determined unacceptable for any number of reasons. The recommended sampling plan assumes that data transmitted to PBS&J for all sample runs will include a limited number of defects. If defects exist, PBS&J will bring them to ARTS' attention. If they continue being a problem, we will bring them to the attention of Ga. DOT along with our assessment describing how the study sample is affected, and how PBS&J's budget is impacted.

ARTS needs to coordinate with PBS&J with regards to defining peak period or peak hour time slots versus off-peak intervals. The exact time that peak hour or off-peak samples are driven may have a significant affect on findings. Ultimately, potential issues pertaining to the exact times that routes are driven need to be reconciled or explained in study documentation.

Subtask 1.3 – Final Sample Design. PBS&J will describe the final sample design that ARTS staff will use in its data collection process in Technical Memorandum Number 1. We strongly recommend that a project meeting or conference call between ARTS, Ga. DOT and PBS&J be conducted at this time. There will be issues pertaining to schedule, obtaining a geographically accurate road base for Aiken County, South Carolina, and last minute coordination issues (like file naming conventions) prior to commencing data collection intensively.

Task 2.0 Data Collection

This element of the Travel Time and Speed Study will be performed by ARTS' staff.

Task 3.0 Data Reduction and Results

PBS&J will reduce data collected by ARTS staff into tables that can be used by ARTS to advance their CMS program and by the Ga. DOT to evaluate its urban area models and emissions analysis procedure.

Subtask 3.1 - Prepare Point Files. This will require coordinates from Ga. DOT's street centerline file. Also, PBS&J will need a positionally accurate GIS file for routes located in South Carolina. For each of the 18 routes in the sampling plan, PBS&J will identify beginning and end positions (x,y coordinate points). For longer routes representing more than one facility type or area type, we will partition the route into segments that are between 0.5 miles to 2.0 miles in length. Points delineating the beginning and end of each of these segments will also be identified.

Subtask 3.2 – Process Route-Level Data. The first level of processing and predominant measure of quality control. PBS&J will use beginning and ending points identified in the previous subtask to separate route-data from non-route data.

We will create a series of files (at least 324) containing data points belonging to each individual route sample. We anticipate that ARTS will transmit data for all sample runs of a particular route in one or two files. For short routes, all 18+ samples should be easily stored in their data recorder before needing to be emptied into a file on their office PC. For longer routes, the data recorders may need downloading more often. We assume maybe two or three data files will be transmitted for these routes (i.e., Route No. 4, US1/US78 in South Carolina).

If, for any reason, ARTS transmits data from more than one route in a single data file it will increase our costs. The same will occur if ARTS is not able to consolidate data for a single route into a maximum of three files. Assuming that ARTS' data collection equipment is responsive to PBS&J's processing requirements, this should not be a problem. If it is, for whatever reasons, then PBS&J needs to remediate the situation with Ga. DOT as quickly as possible.

After all data for a specific route is reduced into files containing data points for individual sample runs, we will perform quality control. Quality control entails two primary activities. First, route-level statistics for all sample runs are reviewed. Statistics include: route length, route run time, direction of travel, begin time, end time. The second level of quality control consists of making plot maps (of the data collection points) overlaid on a highway base map for two or more randomly selected sample runs. Sometimes sample runs are not randomly selected to be plotted. The first-level of quality control may suggest that data points from a certain sample run be plotted.

Subtask 3.3 – Process Segment-Level Data. PBS&J will create a series of files or database tables containing data points belonging to individual segments. These files will be created from coordinates in the point file and the final route files generated in the previous subtask. We anticipate the segment analysis will generate 1,500 to 2,000 segment samples to determine average speeds by time period and direction of travel for different combinations of "Fclass" and

“Area”. An outlier analysis will be used to quality control and analyze this data set.

Subtask 3.4 – Report Travel Time and Average Speed Findings. PBS&J will document the data reduction, quality control and analysis in Technical Memorandum Number 2. PBS&J will work in collaboration with the Ga. DOT and ARTS to determine exactly how to summarize route-level and segment-level data. At a minimum, we will produce a table displaying results of the sample runs by route and several tables containing average speed data from the segment-level analysis by “Fclass” and “Area” codes.
