Found in a variety of habitats from dry to wet. A rather showy aster, the flowers are large and vibrant, varying from shades of purple to pink. Use in drifts with tall native grasses and late-blooming goldenrods. Tolerates occasional flooding. Can be leggy. Naturalizes readily.
