Eastern Redcedar



An extremely tough and adaptable tree, growing well in a variety of sites and soils. Slow-growing and long-lived. Its form can be anything from a slim spire to a broad pyramid. Blue-green foliage turns bronze or reddish in the winter. Blue-grey berries, ripening in the fall, are ornamental all winter. Redcedar is an excellent bird and wildlife tree, providing both food and shelter.

Suggested companions: staghorn sumac (*Rhus typhina*), chokecherry (*Prunus virginiana*), and blackberry (*Rubus allegheniensis*), wild bergamot (*Monarda fistulosa*), black-eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*), little bluestem (*Schizachyrium scoparium*) and other prairie grasses.
