Leaves emerge a reddish-fawn, turn lustrous dark green, and then yellow-brown in the fall. Long taproot and laterals makes transplanting difficult; move as a small specimen, balled and burlapped, in early spring. Prefers acid, sandy soil, but will tolerate a range of conditions. Once established, a problem-free, long-lived tree.
