

Vaccinium angustifolium

Lowbush Blueberry



A very low-growing shrub, often spreading to form loose colonies. Typical of dry, sandy, acid soil. Most delicious of the blueberries; fruit in July and August is small, blue-black with a bloom, and very sweet. Fall color is wonderful -- scarlet to purple.

Suggested companions: white oak (Quercus alba), black oak (Quercus velutina), wintergreen (Gaultheria procumbens), bracken fern (Pteridium aquilinum).
