Wild Raisin



This plant's leaves are glossy green in the summer, but fall is when it really shines, putting on a colorful display. Leaves change first to orange-red then crimson and finally a deep rich purple. The real show-stopper is the fruit, changing from green to pink then red to blue and finally black.

Suggested Companions: arborvitae (*Thuja occidentalis*), black oak (*Quercus velutina*), black spruce (*Picea mariana*), golden alexanders (*Zizia aurea*)
