


Preparing for the projected changes in climate.

## **Adaptation Planning Process**




- This is one example of a process. These steps can vary depending on the needs, resources, etc. of your tribe.
  - 1. Build and maintain support to prepare for climate change
  - 2. Scope projected climate impacts on programs and planning areas
  - 3. Assess vulnerability and risk
  - 4. Set preparedness goals and actions
  - 5. Implement your plan and evaluate effectiveness

## Build and maintain support to prepare for climate change



- The support of your tribal council and community is key.
  - Obtain the tribal council's commitment for a climate change planning effort. This might be in the form of a tribal proclamation, resolution, or declaration.
  - Create a climate change planning team to lead the planning effort.
  - Engage the tribal community in the planning process.
- Make the case for being proactive in preparing for climate change impacts.
  - Tribes are often on the front lines of climate change.
  - Planning for future changes can benefit tribal government today.
  - Proactive planning is more effective and less costly than reacting to impacts as they occur.

## Scope projected climate impacts on programs and planning areas



### Some examples include:

#### Health

- More heat-related illness, less cold-related impacts
- Increases in wildfires may worsen particulate matter (PM) pollution
- Increased production of ground-level ozone in certain regions may worsen local air quality

### **Economy and Infrastructure**

- Sea level rise and increases in heavy precipitation/flooding may affect infrastructure in coastal areas or floodplains
- Increases in extreme weather events may result in higher insurance premiums

#### Housing

Heavy precipitation events may contribute to increases in indoor dampness and building deterioration

#### **Natural Resources**

 Temperature and precipitation changes may adversely affect fish and wildlife species that are traditional food sources

## Assess vulnerability and risk



- How susceptible are your programs and planning areas to harm from climate change impacts?
- Example vulnerability and risk assessment questions:
  - How sensitive is the planning area to the impacts of climate change?
  - How well does the planning area cope with environmental change today? Are there
    existing stresses that would limit its ability to cope with future climate change?
  - How likely is it that an impact will occur to the planning area?
  - What are the known or estimated consequences (economic, ecological, cultural, legal, etc.) if a particular impact does occur?
- How comprehensive these assessments are will vary from tribe to tribe, depending on a number of factors including staff time and funding for the planning process, goals for the plan, etc.

## **Set Goals and Implement Plan**



- Set preparedness goals and actions
  - Develop, select, prioritize preparedness actions
  - Write a plan to meet the goals you have set
- Implement your plan and evaluate effectiveness
  - Monitor and measure progress towards preparedness goals
  - Regularly revisit and modify as new science becomes available and as priorities and needs of the tribe change.
