Background



- Focus on Gulf due to Deepwater Horizon spill
- Executive Order 13554, October 5, 2010:
 - "To effectively address the damage caused by the BP Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill, address the longstanding ecological decline, and begin moving toward a more resilient Gulf Coast ecosystem, ecosystem restoration is needed."
 - Establishes Task Force to develop a Restoration
 Strategy
- DWH NRDA independent but informed by TF

About the Task Force



- To deliver a restoration strategy for the Gulf Coast by October 4, 2011
- Made up of 11 Federal Agencies, White House offices and five Gulf States
- Chair: Lisa P. Jackson
 EPA Administrator
- Vice-Chair: Garret Graves
 State of Louisiana



About the Task Force



- The task force is directed to:
 - Communication and engage with federal, tribal and local governments and stakeholders;
 - Define ecosystem restoration goals and describe milestones towards reaching those goals;
 - Consider existing <u>research</u> and ecosystem restoration <u>planning</u> efforts;
 - Identify major policy areas where coordinated actions between government agencies is needed;
 - Evaluate existing research and monitoring programs and gaps in data collection.



Tribal Engagement




- The task force is directed to:
 - "Communicat[e] and engag[e] with States, tribes, local governments, other stakeholders in the Gulf Coast region, and the public on ecosystem restoration, as well as other aspects of Gulf recovery, including economic recovery and public health efforts;"
 - "Communicate with affected tribes in a manner consistent with Executive Order 13175;"
 - Task Force and technical working groups may include tribal representatives.



Gulf Strategy Proposed Restoration Goals and Primary Focus



Enhance Community Resilience

- science-based decision tools and supporting techniques
- effectively support communities and connect them with other programs, such as health and economic recovery services

Restore and Conserve Habitat

 improve the effectiveness of state and federal conservation and navigation management, develop habitat conservation and restoration strategies, and take actions that consider the varying, and sometimes competing, needs

Restore Water Quality

 use careful science-based review and innovative approaches to enhance water quality

Replenish and Protect Living Coastal and Marine Resources

 promote resource management that focuses on the needs and functions of the ecosystem as a whole




- Process follows EPA's Tribal Consultation Policy



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Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Task Force

The goals of the Task Force are:

- Enhance Community Resilience
- Restore and Conserve Habitat
- Restore Water Quality
- Replenish and Protect Living Coastal and Marine Resources

Process

- Gulf-wide ecosystem restoration strategy (broad in scope)
- Established by Executive Order (E.O. 13554; 10/05/2010)
- No designated funding; facilitate existing funding toward priority restoration actions
- Enhance alignment of Federal, Tribal, State and Local policy to facilitate restoration actions
- Potential future establishment of Gulf Coast Council as long-term coordinating body
- Public engagement
- Requires scientific, legal, and economic support

Natural Resource Damage Assessment and Restoration

The goals of NRDAR are:

- Restore the habitats and resources to the condition they would have been had the oil or hazardous substances not been released
- Compensate the public for the loss of their use or enjoyment of natural resources

Process

- Site specific (nexus to injured resources)
- Authorized under Federal law (OPA, CERCLA, CWA)
- Responsible party pays restoration costs
- Trustee Council oversight
- Public engagement
- Requires scientific, legal, and economic support

The NRDA actions are independent of the Task Force; however, the restoration strategy developed by the TF will help inform restoration planning and implementation by the Trustee Council and other entities working to restore the health and resiliency of the Gulf.


Ecosystem Restoration



Per Executive Order- "Ecosystem restoration" means:

- All activities, projects, methods, and procedures appropriate to enhance the health and resilience of the Gulf Coast ecosystem, as measured in terms of the physical, biological, or chemical properties of the ecosystem, or the services it provides, and to strengthen its ability to support the diverse economies, communities, and cultures of the region.
- Includes activities that <u>initiate or accelerate the recovery</u> of an ecosystem with respect to its <u>health</u>, <u>integrity</u>, <u>and sustainability</u>.
- Includes <u>protecting and conserving ecosystems</u> so they can continue to reduce impacts from tropical storms and other disasters, support robust economies, and assist in mitigating and adapting to the impacts of climate change.
