### Appropriateness of the Factor

- Office of Environmental Justice identified seven factors for assessing disproportionate environmental health impacts
  - proximity & exposure
  - population susceptibility/vulnerability
  - unique exposure pathways
  - cumulative impacts/burdens
  - community capacity to participate
  - vulnerable physical infrastructure
  - chronic community stress

Community capacity to participate is unique from other factors

Not a risk assessment variable

- Requires action on the part of community members
- Community capacity is the only attribute that leads to advocacy

### Intervention Strategies

- Training & Technology Transfer
- Technical Assistance
- Community-Based Participatory Research
- Empowerment Approaches
- Community Organizing/Social Action

## Government & Intervention Strategies

- Majority of EPA intervention strategies focus on technical assistance
- Some government involvement in training & technology transfer
- Good, but few, community-based participatory research projects
- Virtually no empowerment approaches or community organizing/social action models

Government & Intervention Strategies

- What is the role for technical assistance in building community capacity?
- Does government have the right balance in the intervention strategies it provides? Do we have a disconnect?
- How do we support developing skills in organizational capacity, e.g., facilitation, strategic planning, goal setting, communication?

- Authors suggest need for a valid and reliable measurement instrument
