Re: Designation of Nonattainment Areas under the 8-Hour Ozone Standard

Dear Ms. Lubber:

As required by the Clean Air Act and the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century, I am submitting Maine's proposed attainment/nonattainment designations under the 8-hour ozone standard.

We have prepared our proposal within the context of Maine's full support of the 8-hour standard. In 1999, we initiated a legislative effort requiring that the State's ozone health advisories be based on that standard, regardless of any challenges to it. It is Maine's position that the 8-hour standard is appropriately protective of public health and the environment.

With that perspective, we have reviewed the State's 1997-1999 ozone monitoring data as the foundation for this proposal. As recommended by EPA, we have also considered population density, emissions, meteorology, topography, geography and transport. The enclosed Technical Support Document contains the full analysis.

Figure 2 of that document is a map of Maine's areas of nonattainment under the 8-hour standard. It includes coastal towns from Kittery to Georgetown and the Islands from Isle au Haut to Mount Desert and Winter Harbor. I propose that the rest of the state be designated as in attainment.

This proposal reflects the uniqueness of Maine's ozone problem. The analyzed data show that we clearly are impacted by overwhelming transport, as the most significant areas of influence on our monitored nonattainment sites are, in fact, outside state lines. (See Section III). Including additional in-state areas in Maine's proposal would not present the opportunity to improve air quality in the coastal corridor.


