Dear Governor Turnbull:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is in the process of evaluating whether air quality meets the 8-hour national health based standard for ground level ozone. As part of our evaluation, we have reviewed information on air quality in the Virgin Islands and determined that air quality meets the federal health standard. Accordingly, EPA intends to designate the Territory as attaining the 8-hour ozone standard.

Under the Clean Air Act, EPA is required to promulgate designations for new or revised standards, such as the 8-hour ozone standard and will do so by April 15, 2004. Areas that violate, or contribute to violations of the 8-hour ozone standard will be designated as nonattainment. We have reviewed ozone air quality data for the Virgin Islands and all ozone concentrations are less than the 0.08 ppm 8-hour health standard. To violate the 8-hour standard, the average of the fourth highest daily ozone from three years of data would have to exceed 0.08 ppm.

If you wish to provide additional information about 8-hour ozone in the Virgin Islands, please provide this information by February 6, 2004. EPA is obligated to make final designations by April 15, 2004.
