PRIA 3

Background: PRIA 2 ends September 30, 2012 (end of FY 2012) with subsequent reduced fees FY 2013 – 60% of fee and no timeframes for EPA to make decision on an action FY 2014 – 30% of fee and no timeframes unless reauthorized by Congress

Since June 6, OPP and the PRIA Coalition have met twice and formed workgroups to discuss various aspects of the legislation. The PRIA Coalition includes pesticide industry's trade associations and public interest groups.

Workgroups –

- 1) Inerts (types of actions subject to a fee)
- 2) Initial Screen (improve early identification/correction of application deficiencies)
- 3) Maintenance Fees/Set Asides (support registration review, worker protection, applicator training and activities to reduce pesticide risk and support IPM)
- 4) Decision Timeframes (obtain final/clean labels for improved public access)
- 5) Information Technology (develop electronic tools to increase the quality of applications, for registrants/applicants to monitor the status of their applications, and to improve use of species location information through GIS tools)
- Separate workgroups with the Registration, Antimicrobial and Biopesticides Divisions to specify the types of applications subject to a fee
