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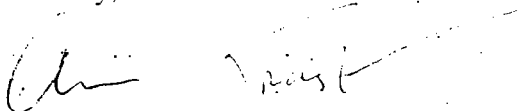
With this information now available, EPA has asked Ms. Cox to initiate phone calls to the *various stakeholders in order to determine when, and how to proceed with the proposed dialogue.* In the coming weeks, you will be contacted by Ms. Cox as part of her effort to assist us in developing an effective structure or process that enables us to move forward in a cooperative and productive manner with the proposed dialogue.

EPA anticipates that the dialogue would focus primarily on the Agency's upcoming cleanup decision at Allendale and Lyman Mill Ponds and their associated wetlands. If the dialogue proves effective and productive for participating parties, discussions about future investigations, monitoring, and impacts of the cleanup decisions on downstream areas might also be included in the dialogue as it moves forward.

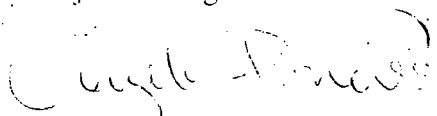

Last winter, EPA engaged a neutral facilitator, Marion Cox, to speak with various parties about participating in a structured dialogue regarding the future of the Centredale Manor Restoration Project site and cleanup alternatives for Allendale and Lyman Mill Ponds.

The outcome of those discussions was captured in a report which Ms. Cox prepared and EPA distributed in October. From the report, EPA learned that there was strong interest among the various parties to participate in a dialogue.
