Hello Susan,

Thank you for attending the July informational meeting and for providing your thoughts about the Centredale Manor Restoration Project Superfund Site. Just to clarify, we will be issuing the Proposed Plan this fall -- likely in October-- at which time the formal public comment period will start. July's meeting was an informational meeting with the intent to provide some background information and to introduce some potential cleanup approaches to address the contamination. EPA hasn't formally selected a preferred cleanup approach and when it does so, it will be a part of the Proposed Plan that the public can comment on. Please resubmit your comments during the formal comment period so that they may become a part of the formal record. I will make sure you are on our mailing list so that you will get a copy of the Proposed Plan with all of the information about the formal comment period and the ways you can submit your comments. I am a property owner directly affected by the Superfund Site, as my home is located at 22 Aldrich St. North Providence, RI. After attending the 7/21/11 meeting, looking over the materials and touring the Allendale, Lyman Mill and Oxbow areas, I would like to comment on the Proposed Plan. I would prefer the EPA and DEM do nothing more than post prominent signs in the areas noted and leave the sites as they are now.

To destroy these wildlife areas would irrevocably change the beauty and landscape of the river and surrounding neighborhoods. This would constitute a major loss for myself and my family, who appreciate the beauty of the riverbank setting and the waterfowl who inhabit the area.

I grew up downstream in Providence but still on the banks of the Woonasquatucket and I can tell you the neighborhoods declined when the millpond was destroyed in order to build the RT 6/10 connector. The Woonasquatucket itself was never a major swimming attraction, even back in the 50's and early 60's in Providence it was a dirty working river.

I wish for my comments to become part of the public record and taken into serious consideration.
