## Call Notes

- EPA wetlands development grant is a useful source of funds for macroinvertebrate sampling and bioassessments
  - o Funding is inconsistent though due to competitive aspect, leading to work stoppage and gaps in data
- Macroinvertebrate sampling requires strong regional/local knowledge of the area due to differing waterbody types and ecology
  - This makes it more difficult for an agency such as EPA to provide the specialized assistance required
  - o Universities may be able to provide help
  - o Certain federal agencies could possibly provide some help as well
    - Tuolumne working with US Forest Service
  - Also consider non-profits, state agencies

- Arizona's state contact is Patti Spindler of ADEQ
  - o phs@azdeq.gov or 602-771-4543
- Local partnerships seems to be the most effective
  - o Ex) Stream Team in Southern CA is a partnership of local tribes
    - Shared cost and expertise
    - Local organization (NAEPC) has helped organize trainings
- Supporting a tribally-run bioassessment laboratory is not a high priority
  - O CWA 106 funding is limited as is, and reluctant to try and take any funds away from that program
  - o Much knowledge is needed in order to successfully implement a certified laboratory. Would take too much funding to support this endeavor at this time.
- Yurok Tribe is amenable to training tribes if they are willing/able to make the trip to their reservation
- Follow Up
  - o A training at Annual Conference
    - Wetland macroinvertebrate sampling was mentioned as a potential topic
    - Stream Team possibly can give a presentation to demonstrate how they organized
    - Potential future training topic: Writing QAPPs for macroinvertebrate sampling
  - o Formation of a Bioassessment Workgroup
    - Meet semi-annually or annually, up to workgroup (can decide next call)
    - To share ideas, different experiences, sources of assistance or funding, possibly coordinate trainings
