We are pleased to announce that we have two new project officers in the Water Division, Tribal Section. Jeannie Wang and Kate Pinkerton.

Jeanny Wang started in late March in the Tribal Water Section, where she provides grant and technical assistance to five tribes in the Klamath River watershed. Jeanny has spent many years working on environmental projects outside the U.S. She has promoted protection of the black-necked crane on China's Yun-Gui Plateau, traveled to Siberia's Lake Baikal, and worked on eco-regional water planning in the Dominican Republic and Haiti. She has consulted on UN development projects in China, Mongolia, Russia, Ukraine, Belarus, and Laos.

Kate Pinkerton started on May 4th in the Tribal Water Section. She will be working with northern California tribes. Kate is originally from Kentucky and has BA and MS degrees in Environmental Science from American University. Before starting at Region 9, she was an Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education program participant on the Hypoxia Team at EPA HQ for three years. She focused on helping states and tribes create nutrient reduction strategies for addressing nitrogen and phosphorus pollution in the Mississippi-Atchafalaya River Basin and hypoxia in the Gulf of Mexico. She also worked on Chesapeake Bay water quality issues at the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center.

#### **Tribal Air Funding**

42 proposals for FY16 tribal Clean Air Act funding were received in February and are currently being reviewed. We expect to send funding decisions by the end of May. Please contact Sara Bartholomew, Bartholomew.sara@epa.gov, or 415-947-4100, with questions.

#### Tribal New Source Review (NSR) Rule Updates

NSR permits are legal documents that the facility owners/operators must abide by. The permit specifies what construction is allowed, what emission limits must be met, and often how the emissions source must be operated.

In December, 2013, EPA proposed a rule to simplify the Clean Air Act permitting process for certain smaller sources of air pollution commonly found in Indian country. The action proposed: (1) general permits and permits by rule for certain source categories, (2) an extension of the minor source permitting deadline for true minor sources within the oil and gas source category, and (3) to change the policy in the Indian Country Minor NSR Rule to allow for the use of general permits (and permits by rule) to create synthetic minor sources. This action will ensure that air quality in Indian country is protected by implementing the Tribal Minor Source New Source Review Rule issued by EPA in July 2011.

The phased in regulation dates and phased in deadlines have all passed, and the rule is in effect in all of Indian Country. Tribes need to contact EPA Region 9 to get a permit for new construction or modification of major sources of air pollution, and register any minor sources.

EPA has proposed general permits for eleven categories of emission sources: (1) hot mix asphalt plants; (2) stone quarrying, crushing, and screening facilities; (3) gasoline dispensing facilities; (4) petroleum dry cleaners; (5) auto body repair and miscellaneous surface coating operations; (6) spark ignition engines; (7) compression ignition engines; (8) sawmills; (9) concrete batch plants; (10) boilers; and (11) graphic arts and printing operations. This will streamline the existing process and minimize the burden on reviewing authorities and sources.

Along with the permits themselves, EPA is making available, on its website, several implementation documents and tools to assist applicants in completing the permit application forms on which we are requesting comment. # EPA's Proposal to Update the Air Quality Standards for Ground-Level Ozone

On November 25, 2014, the EPA proposed to strengthen the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for ground-level ozone, based on extensive scientific evidence about ozone's effects. The proposed updates will improve public health protection, particularly for children, the elderly, and people of all ages who have lung diseases such as asthma. The updates also will improve protection for trees, plants and ecosystems.

- Proposed primary and secondary range: 65 70 ppb
- Currently: 75 ppb
- Level set for both primary "health-based" std and
- Secondary "welfare-based" std (remanded)
- Taking comment on levels as low as 60 ppb
- Science advisory committee (CASAC) recommended:
- 60 70 ppb for 8-hour primary
- "W-126" seasonal metric for secondary
- 90-day public comment period ended on March 17
- Three hearings were held nationally, one in Sacramento February 2, 2015
- Final rule court-ordered deadline: October 1, 2015
- Designation decisions by October 2017
