Grants From the EPA

Highlights from that webpage currently include:

Increasing Community Awareness and Use of Environmental Information through Education and Outreach – Announces the availability of funds and solicits proposals for projects that will provide key audiences with an opportunity to attain a greater understanding of Toxics Release Inventory (TRI) data and other related toxic chemical information. National Environmental Leadership Award in Asthma Management – Due February 12. The EPA is seeking school-based asthma management programs to apply for this national award. For more information please see the program webpage.

AmeriCorps Planning Grants – Due February 6.

Funding From Other Entities

U.S. Bureau of Reclamation Water and Energy Efficiency Grants Due: January 17, 2013. The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's WaterSMART Water and Energy Efficiency Grant program provides funding to conserve and use water more efficiently, increase the use of renewable energy and improve energy efficiency, benefit endangered and threatened species, facilitate water markets, and carry out activities to address climate-related impacts on water. FHWA Pilot Projects: Climate Change and Extreme Weather Vulnerability Assessments and Adaptation Options Analyses - \$75,000 to \$300,000 per pilot project, Due: January 22, 2013. The Federal Highway Administration is soliciting pilot projects to conduct analysis in one of two areas related to climate change and extreme weather adaptation: 1) assessments of transportation vulnerability to climate change and extreme weather events, or 2) developing options for improving resiliency of transportation facilities or systems to climate changes and/or extreme weather events. 8 to 15 pilots will be selected and funded. EDA Economic Development Assistance Programs Next due: March 13, 2013. Grants will support the implementation of regional economic development strategies designed to create jobs, leverage private capital, encourage economic development, and strengthen America's ability to compete in the global marketplace. EDA solicits applications from communities to develop initiatives that advance new ideas and creative approaches to address rapidly evolving economic conditions. EDA's investment priorities include sustainable development and economically distressed and underserved communities. See the grant opportunity synopsis.
