New App for Health of Waterways

EPA has a new app and website to help people find information on the condition of thousands of lakes, rivers and streams across the United States from their smart phone, tablet or desktop computer. Available at http://www.epa.gov/mywaterway, the "How's My Waterway" app and website uses GPS technology or a user-entered zip code or city name to provide information about the quality of local water bodies. This new app provides easy, user-friendly access to the health of a waterway, whether it is safe for swimming and fishing, and what is being done about any reported problems.

The Department of Interior (DOI) seeks nominations for the Advisory Committee on Climate Change and Natural Resource Science

The Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community Food Projects

This grant program is accepting applications through November 28. Community food projects should increase food self-reliance in low-income communities by addressing local food production, infrastructure, or marketing issues. Up to \$25,000 is available for planning projects and up to \$125,000 per year and a total of \$300,000 over three years is available for implementation, with matching cash or in-kind contributions. Private, non-profit entities with experience in community food systems and demonstrated ability to manage the grant and share results are eligible to apply. Western Sustainable Agriculture Research (SARE)

This program is accepting project proposals through December 5. Two types of Western SARE grants are noteworthy. Producer grants provide up to \$15,000 to a farm or ranch operator and Professional + Producer grants provide up to \$50,000 to an agricultural professional such as a farm advisor working with a group of at least five farm or ranch operators. Projects in both categories must involve producers in every stage of the project, address agricultural sustainability, and include distinctive approaches and creative methods of delivering the results to other producers. Environmental Justice (EJ) Small Grants Program

This program is accepting project proposals through January 7, 2013. Federally recognized tribal governments, tribal organizations, and non-profits are eligible to apply for up to \$30,000 to fund collaborative projects to empower their communities to address local environmental and public health issues. The program has funded sustainable agriculture projects in recent years, but the competition for funding is stiff. Tribes that have applied unsuccessfully in the past are welcome to ask the Region 9 Environmental Justice office for a debrief on their application, to learn how to improve their chances in the 2013 proposal evaluation process. Discharge of Pesticides to Water - NPDES Pesticide General Permit (PGP) Webcast on Annual Reporting Requirements

EPA Headquarters is planning to hold a webcast on November 29, 2012 addressing annual reporting requirements under the new federal NPDES Pesticides General Permit (PGP), which covers all tribal lands. If you have questions on how pesticide applications to, over, or near water on tribal lands must now be reported and tracked, you are encouraged to join this webcast. Whether you are a tribal applicator subject to the permit or a member of a tribe concerned about outside applicators on your land, EPA wants everyone to be aware of the legal requirements and information sources available. The Federal Surplus Personal Property Donation Program (aka GSAXcess or Federal Excess) allows certain organizations, including tribes, to obtain excess federal property the government no longer needs. Equipment available in the system ranges from vehicles, boats, and office furniture to consumable office, field and laboratory supplies and equipment. Tribal governments may find the Federal Excess is a source of low-cost equipment and supplies needed to support programmatic work. Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers, Inc. Fined for Violations on Navajo Nation

EPA Region 9 recently fined Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers, Inc. of Greensboro, North Carolina for two violations of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodentcide Act, which occurred on land that the company leases from the Navajo Nation. Specifically, the company did not follow product labeling directions for Rozol Prairie Dog Bait when performing an application on Navajo Nation lands. The label requires that the bait be applied by hand and at least six inches down into the prairie dog burrows. The farm's applicator applied the bait through a hose in such a way that product remained on the surface of the ground. The company will pay the maximum penalty allowed by law for the violations. Procedures for Accessing EPA Resources for Emergency Responses to Hazardous Materials Incidents on Tribal or Federal Lands in Arizona

Call 9-1-1 first. Then notify the National Response Center at 1 800-424-8802. A tribe can also notify Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) at 602-390-7894 or 602-771-2330. If it is a transportation-related spill, call 602-223-2212 at the Arizona Department of Public Safety. In addition, local jurisdictions need to be notified of the incident. If ADEQ is unable to respond to a hazardous materials incident on tribal and federal lands, contact the National Response Center at 800-424-8802, and ask for the EPA Region 9 Duty Officer. EPA has On-Scene Coordinators placed in San Francisco, and Los Angeles, CA, Carson City, NV and Phoenix, AZ who can provide timely response to a hazardous materials incident.
