- Meaningful and timely input on actions that may affect tribal interest




Salt River Reservation



#### Background: Region 9 Tribes

- I47 federally recognized
  Tribes located in Region 9
- Number of Tribes
  Participating in EPA
  Programs
  - I 30 General Assistance
  - 101- Water Quality
  - 85 Nonpoint Source





# US EPA Final Policy on Consultation and Coordination with Tribal Governments

#### Consultation

"A process of meaningful communication and coordination between EPA and tribal officials **prior** to EPA making decisions that affect tribes"

Four Phases:

- I. Identification
- 2. Notification
- 3. Input
- 4. Follow-Up

#### Identification

- EPA Identifies activities that *may be appropriate for consultation* 
  - Should include:
    - Determination of Complexity of Activity
    - Potential Implications for Tribes
    - Time/Resources Constraints
- Activities that may require consultation (not limited to):
  - Regulations or Rules
  - Policies, guidance documents, directives
  - Budget and priority planning
  - Legislative Comments
  - Permits
  - Enforcement
  - Emergency Response Activities

#### Notification

- EPA notifies the tribes of activities that may be appropriate for consultation
  - Options:
    - Letters/Mass Mailing
    - Telephone and Conference Calls
    - Meetings
    - Other methods agreed upon with Tribes
- Start early!
  - Provide sufficient time for Tribal Officials to make informed decisions
  - Make sure Tribal Officials know the process for providing input

#### Input

- Tribes provide input to EPA on the consultation matter via:
  - Telephone and/or Conference Calls
  - Meetings (group or one-on-one)
  - Letters
  - Other agreed upon methods
- There may be multiple "rounds" of input

#### Follow-Up

- EPA provides feed-back on how Tribal input was considered in the final action to tribes that participated in consultation
  - Formal, Written Communication from a senior EPA Official to the most senior Tribal Official involved

#### How, When & Who

- How EPA or Tribe identifies matters for Consultation
  - Tribally Requested Consultation
  - National & Regional Offices
  - National and Regional Tribal Partnership Groups
- When in the process to consult
  - Early enough for Tribes to give informed input
- Who is in charge of this process?
  - Tribal Consultation Advisor Nate Lau in Region 9
  - Senior Managers in Program Offices
