Re: Determination of Indian Country Status of HRI Section 8

Dear Sir:

The undersigned are members of the Eastern Navajo Allottees Association. We are owners of allotted lands located in McKinley County, New Mexico. This area is also known as the Eastern Navajo Agency. We own and/or live on allotments in the vicinity of HRI's Section 8 property.

It is our position that Section 8 is not Indian Country for the following reasons.

- Section 8 has not been set aside by the federal government for the use of Indians.
- The fee 160 acre portion of Section 8 owned by HRI is not subject to federal supervision.
- Section 8 contains 160 acres of fee land owned by HRI with the remaining
 480 acres owned by the Bureau of Land Management. There is no Indian ownership associated with this section of land.
- This property has historically been used by its non-Indian owners for uranium mining. It is the highest and best use of the property.

- The fee portion of Section 8 is subject to taxation by McKinley County.
 In exchange for these taxes, McKinley County provides basic services including police protection, fire protection, emergency medical services and road maintenance.
- 6. Main access to the fee portion of Section 8 is provided by State Highway 566 which is maintained by the New Mexico Department of Transportation. There is also McKinley County Road 77, maintained by McKinley County, which provides road access to Section 8. There are no BIA or Navajo maintained roads in the vicinity of Section 8.
- Public schools and school transportation for Section 8 and the Churchrock
 Chapter are provided by the Gallup/McKinley County public school system.
- Neither the Churchrock Chapter nor Navajo Tribe provides any area infrastructure or services to the fee portion of Section 8.
- 9. The economic pursuits of the area, including and surrounding Section 8, would be enhanced by the finding that Section 8 is not Indian Country because it would allow HRI's proposed in situ operation to proceed, providing desperately needed jobs in the area and additional tax revenues to enhance services provided by McKinley County in the checkerboard area.
- 10. According to the McKinley County Comprehensive Plan Phase 2, August 22, 2005, White Paper Regarding Socioeconomics and Growth Analysis, Conditions, Issues and Policy Directions; the Navajo Nation has not designated the Churchrock Chapter as a primary or secondary growth center in Navajo Nation Economic Plans. Thus there are no competing economic pursuits in the area opposing HRI's proposed operations.

- The Navajo Nation in the April 2005 ban of uranium mining and 11. processing have deprived allottees of their rights as citizens of the Navajo Nation. The proposed law was secretly pushed through Navajo Nation legislative committees prior to being voted on by the Navajo Nation Council without opportunity of allottees, as Navajo Nation citizens, to respond. Yet non-indian lawyers/environmentalists were allowed to speak in support of the ban. The same happened before the Navajo Nation Council prior to voting on the issue: allottees, as citizens of the Navajo Nation, were refused the opportunity to speak, yet non-indians spoke before the Council.
- 12. Navajo allottees, like other citizens of New Mexico and the United States, aspire to own their land with full rights of alienation. A finding that fee land such as Section 8 is Indian Country would establish bad precedent for other Indian or non-Indian fee owners in the checkerboard region, and would deprive the allottees of their rights as landowners.
