Linda S. BirnbaumDirector
National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences and National Toxicology Program

Linda S. Birnbaum, Ph.D., is director of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and the National Toxicology Program (NTP). As NIEHS and NTP director, Birnbaum oversees a budget of \$780 million that funds biomedical research to discover how the environment influences human health and disease. The Institute also supports training, education, technology transfer, and community outreach. NIEHS currently funds more than 1,000 research grants. A native of New Jersey, Dr. Birnbaum received her M.S. and Ph.D. in microbiology from the

University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

She is the author of more than 700 peer-reviewed publications, book chapters, abstracts, and reports. Birnbaum's own research focuses on the pharmacokinetic behavior of environmental chemicals; mechanisms of actions of toxicants, including endocrine disruption; and linking of real-world exposures to health effects. A board certified toxicologist, Birnbaum has served as a federal scientist for nearly 32 years. Prior to her appointment as NIEHS and NTP Director in 2009, she spent 19 years at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) where she directed the largest division focusing on environmental health research. Birnbaum started her federal career with 10 years at NIEHS, first as a senior staff fellow at the National Toxicology Program, then as a principal investigator and research microbiologist, and finally as a group leader for the Institute's Chemical Disposition Group. She is also an adjunct professor in the Gillings School of Global Public Health, and the Department of Environmental Sciences and Engineering at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Bicky Corman is the Deputy General Counsel at EPA and has served as the Deputy Associate Administrator for the Office of Policy. Bicky has handled environmental and policy issues at the local and federal levels and previously served at the EPA, the Department of Justice, the U.S. Senate and the District of Columbia Department of the Environment. Bicky I. Corman

joins our agency from the District of Columbia's Department of the Environment, where she served as the General Counsel. Prior to working for the city, Bicky was a trial attorney for the Environment and Natural Resources Division/Environmental Enforcement Section of the U.S. Department of Justice, and earlier, staffed Senator Frank Lautenberg's Hazardous Waste Subcommittee. Bicky began her career at EPA as the Assistant Regional Counsel for Region 2 and as a staff attorney for the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance. Bicky graduated form Suffolk University Law School in Boston and completed her undergraduate education at the Sophie Newcomb College of Tulane University.



Michelle DePass

Assistant Administrator of the Office of International and Tribal Affairs Environmental Protection Agency

Michelle DePass was confirmed by the Senate as the Assistant Administrator, Office of International Affairs (OIA), on April 28, 2009. As of March 2010, she assumed leadership of EPA's tribal portfolio and now is the Assistant Administrator for International and Tribal Affairs (OITA). DePass comes to EPA after serving as an Environment and Community Development Program Officer at the Ford Foundation. As Program Officer, she was

responsible for supporting the development of sound environmental policies and practices in the local, national and international arenas.

As Assistant Administrator, she leads EPA's international and tribal portfolios, and is responsible for the full range of EPA's environmental policy development and program implementation in tribal lands and in sovereign nations outside of US borders. In this capacity, DePass represents the EPA within the United States government and works with tribal governments, foreign governments and international organizations on matters relating to the environment.

DePass is a lawyer, public administrator and policy maker who has worked with environmental and human and civil rights organizations, academic institutions, and labor. She has also worked in all levels of government, including city, state, and federal. She received her B.A. in Political Science from Tufts University, her law degree from Fordham University School of Law, and a Master's degree in Public Administration from Baruch College School of Public Affairs.

Before her time at the Ford Foundation, DePass taught federal environmental law and policy at the City University of New York, and developed a job training program for aspiring youth in conjunction with the National Institute for Environmental Health Sciences. She also served as Executive Director of the New York City Environmental Justice Alliance. As Executive Director, she was an advocate to local communities and community organizations in environmental policy negotiations. DePass obtained experience in the regulatory realm as an environmental manager of the City of San Jose. She went on to practice law with the Center for Constitutional Rights in New York as a William Kunstler Racial Justice Fellow. DePass then returned to government as a Senior Policy Advisor at the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP). DePass was born in Queens, New York. She is the daughter of Rupert and Marsyl DePass from Jamaica, West Indies, and married to Joshua Paulson.

Allison Whipple Rockefeller is deeply committed to the communication of American heritage, history, and values, especially as these pertain to our national resources and the role of nature in shaping American history and American character. Allison is the founder of the National Audubon Society's Women In Conservation Program and Founding Chair of the program's Rachel Carson Awards Council. The Women In Conservation Program was created for girls and women to discover the world of conservation and connect with the best and brightest women leaders in the environmental movement. The program promotes environmental education through a website, womeninconservation.org, a

competitive internship program, and a school outreach initiative which brings prominent women environmentalists into all-girls schools.

The centerpiece of the program is The National Audubon Society's Rachel Carson Award, one of the most coveted awards for American women in the environmental movement, celebrating the history, stature and significance of women's environmental achievements. The Rachel Carson Award is presented annually in New York City and since 2004 has recognized 37 women whose immense talent, expertise, and energy has greatly advanced conservation and the environmental movement locally and globally. Honorees are chosen from the worlds of grassroots activism, environmental justice, journalism, academia, science, land protection, entertainment, business, law and philanthropy. The Award celebrates its 10th anniversary in New York City May 29, 2013 and will salute women's achievements in environmental history including the vast importance of Rachel Carson and Lady Bird Johnson. Additionally, all past honorees will be saluted for their continued commitment. Historian Douglas Brinkley will be making remarks on his much anticipated book, Rachel Carson and the Silent Spring Revolution.

Allison has been a lifelong conservationist with a deep-seated love for nature and the American landscape. She was elected the first Alumna Board Chair of the Student Conservation Association thirty years after she served as a high school volunteer in its program. The organization, started by Elizabeth Titus Putnam in 1958, has sent more than 85,000 student volunteers into National Parks across the country and instilled in Allison a lifelong love of American parkland. Since then, she has dedicated much focus to the creation, preservation and promotion of American parks and open space on the national, state, and local level. As a native New Yorker, Allison has served as Commission Member to the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation in the Saratoga/Capital District and currently in the New York City Region, serving under four Governors. She is a long-time member of the Women's Board of the Central Park Conservancy.

Allison Rockefeller has also joined the effort in environmental revitalization and Brownfield reclamation. She founded Cornerstone Parks, the "Pumps-to-Parks" Initiative, which worked to create a network of small parks and community centers by converting closed gas station sites and their buildings into open green space and centers for community use promoting community economic development, Brownfield reclamation and adaptive reuse. New York State's "Pumps-to-Parks" program was created to address the challenge of the 200,000+ closed gas stations across America. It was adopted as a state program by Governor Eliot Spitzer.

She is immensely proud to be a woman in conservation and hopes to bring many girls and women into this important work who might not have been inspired to do so.

Ms. Stoner's extensive career in environmental policy and law began in 1987 as a trial attorney in the Environment and Natural Resources Division of the U.S. Department of Justice.

Following her time at the Department of Justice, she served as Director of the Office of Policy Analysis in the office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency where she contributed to development of EPA's environmental auditing and self-disclosure policies. Most recently Ms. Stoner served as the Co-Director of the Natural Resources Defense Council's (NRDC) Water Program. As the Director, she was responsible for supporting the development of sound environmental policies and practices to protect water resources under the clean Water Act. Among her many responsibilities, Ms. Stoner spearheaded NRDC's work to clean up the Anacostia River in Washington, DC including facilitating the use of green infrastructure and low-impact development measures that reduce stormwater flows and sewer overflows into the Anacostia. Ms. Stoner is a 1986 graduate of Yale Law School and a 1982 graduate of the University of Virginia.

As Chair, Nancy serves as the principal environmental policy adviser to the President. Prior to her appointment, Sutley was the Deputy Mayor for Energy and Environment for the city of Los Angeles, California. She represented Los Angeles on the Board of Directors for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California and served on the California State Water Resources Control Board from 2003- 2005. Sutley also worked for California Governor Gray Davis as Energy Advisor, managing state and federal regulations, legislative affairs, finances and press relations. She served as Deputy Secretary for policy and intergovernmental relations in the California EPA from 1999-2003. She advised on water and air pollution policy, and established budget and

non-profit sector, building experience in law and policy, and advocating on a range of public health and environmental issues. She previously served at EPA as Associate Administrator for Office of Congressional and Intergovernmental Relations.

Prior to joining the Obama Administration, Ms. Thompson served as Vice President for Public Policy and Communications at the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation. From 2001-2004, she was an Environment Program Officer of The Pew Charitable Trusts. Ms. Thompson served eight years in the Clinton-Gore Administration in the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency. Previously, Ms. Thompson was Chief of Staff to U.S. Senator Barbara A. Mikulski; a partner in both a public policy consulting firm and a law firm; Counsel for the National Organization for Women and the San Francisco Human Rights Commission; and an adjunct faculty member at Hastings College of the Law, University of California. UPROSE

UPROSE is a 45 year-old nationally recognized intergenerational and multi-racial community based organization. Located in Sunset Park, Brooklyn- NYC's largest significant maritime industrial area UPROSE is dedicated to environmental and social justice. Elizabeth received her BA in Political Science from Fordham University and law degree from Northeastern University School of Law. She is admitted to practice in the States of New York and New Jersey.

Elizabeth is part of the New York City environmental justice leadership responsible for getting NY State's first Brownfield legislation and NYC's Solid Waste Management Plan passed. In Sunset Park, Brooklyn she facilitated an aggressive urban forestry initiative, helped double the amount of open space and developed a project that resulted in the retro-fit and re-powering of diesel trucks for a local business. She successfully organized a community coalition that defeated a 520 mega-watt power plant application. Elizabeth created a community participatory model that resulted in a community led greenway design for the waterfront and has become the model for building community resilience. Over \$10million dollars have been allocated for the greenway and park. Recently, the NYS Regional Economic Council awarded NYC DOT a \$1.2m grant to partner with UPROSE to facilitate community engagement in planning an upland connector that would connect the community and the industrial waterfront using climate adaptation and community resilience tools. In response to community demand after Hurricane Sandy, UPROSE has launched the Sunset Park Climate Justice and Community Resiliency Center, NYC's first grassroots-led, bottom-up, climate adaptation and community resiliency planning project.

In addition to her community leadership, she has raised awareness of the need to adapt low income waterfront communities like Sunset Park to the changing climate through her many public, volunteer roles including: Member of Mayor Bloomberg's Sustainability Advisory Board (SAB) for New York City; and as Chair of USEPA's National Environmental Justice Advisory Council (NEJAC). Under Ms. Yeampierre's leadership, the NEJAC created a new workgroup called the Resilience in Industrial Waterfront Communities Workgroup to bring new federal agency attention to issues related to these communities. New York City's plan to become a sustainable city of the 21st Century, PlaNYC, includes climate adaptation and community engagement as priorities due in part to her advocacy on the Mayor's SAB.

Elizabeth is the recipient of many distinguished awards and her work is referenced in several books.
